1. Introduction

1.1 Introduction to this study

This study provides an overview of the shabtis for lady Tayu-heret. In addition to the published examples I added the shabtis I have come across in the world, with the help of my friend Glen Janes. I will start of with a short introduction of the ancient owner Tayu-heret and describe her shabtis in general. In the following chapters you will find the museum parallels (chapter 2) and the privately owned parallels (chapter 3).

1.2 Who was Tayu-heret?

Tayu-heret is considered to be wife and possible the sister of High Priest of Amen Masaharta. Her titles include Chief of the Harem of Amen-Ra, King of the Gods. They were both buried in DB320 also known as the Royal Cache.

1.3 Description of the shabtis

In this document I will only describe the overseers.

The overseers are carrying a whip in the left hand to either straight up or towards the left shoulders. In some case the whip is not indicated. The right arm is stretched next to the body with a clinching fist. The tripartite wig has detailed front lappets (in the faience).

The overseer types vary in size around 10 cm.

The overseer types are sometimes uninscribed. The ones that are inscribed at either the front (4 exampes known) on the skirt or at the back that read: "The Illuminated One, the Osiris, Tayu-heret, True of Voice". It is unclear how many overseer shabtis were originally buried in DB 320 for Tayu-heret, but 36 seems a safe consideration.

The following information is provided for each piece:

Location:	The city in which the museum is located is mentioned as well as the name of the museum.
Published:	If the museum piece is published in a book or on the internet the name of the publication, author and the relevant page number is mentioned.
Inventory nb	The inventory number is mentioned if known.
Provenance:	For as far as available the provenance of the piece is described, detailing the previous owners prior to the entering into the collection of the museum.
Height: Comments:	The specific height of the shabti is described in centimetres. Provides the comments of the author to the specific pieces, for example relating to the condition or quality of the object compared to the other parallels.
