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1. Introduction

1.1 Introduction to this study

This study provides an overview of all published shabtis for Nesi-Paouty-Taouy. In addition to the published examples I added the shabtis I have come across in the world. I will start of with a short introduction of the ancient owner and describe his shabtis in general. In the following chapters you will find the museum parallels (chapter 2) and the privately owned parallels (chapter 3).

1.2 Who was Nesi-Paouty-Taouy?

We have little information about the owner to which these shabtis belong. There is a coffin fragment found in the Ramesseum by Quibell. It is unknown whether this fragment is for our owner, but likely not. There are several references to persons with this name in Ranke. The coffin of a Nesi-Paouty-Taouy was discovered in the famous priest cachette at Deir el Bahri. This coffin is now in Vienna. However, considering the fact that the shabtis described in this catalogue were recorded in museum collections prior to the discovery of that tomb means that they cannot be from this cachette. Furthermore, neither Daressy nor Newberry recorded shabtis for this owner in the cachette. So, the tomb location remains unknown.

The name can be translated as: "he who belongs to the primal tempory of the two lands". Paouty is therefore another name for the god Ra-Amun, who is also called the primary one. Furthermore, the god Ra-Atum was often called "the Lord of the two lands". The two lands represent Upper and Lower Egypt.

Based on the typology we can date the shabti to the beginning of the Third Intermediate Period.

1.3 Description of the shabtis

The workmanship on the shabtis for Nesi-Paouty-Taouy is fair. A distinction can be made between worker types, carrying two hoes, and overseer types carrying a whip in the left

hand with the right arm stretched next to the body flinching another whip. The worker and overseer types all feature a tripartite black painted wig. The worker types are some 12 cm. The length of the overseer type is unknown at this moment.

The worker and overseer types of Nesi-Paouty-Taouy are all inscribed with just "Osiris" followed by the name and ending with "true of voice".

There are four shabti gangs with the name of this owner, likely to be for different persons. In the database of Miquel Angel they are identified as these series:
