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1. Introduction

1.1 Introduction to this study

This study provides an overview of the worker shabtis for *Tayu-heret*. In addition to the published examples, we added the shabtis we have come across in the world, with the help of Glenn Janes work and the Sehedj database. We will start with an introduction of the owner *Tayu-heret* and describe her workers shabtis in general. In the following chapters you will find the museum parallels (chapter 2) and the privately owned parallels (chapter 3).

1.2 Who was Tayu-heret?

Tayu-heret is considered to have been a wife and maybe a sister of the High Priest of Amen Masaharta. Her titles include "Chief of the Harem of Amen-Re" and "King of the Gods" (1). They were both buried in DB320 also known as the Royal Cache at Deir el-Bahari. Her mummy was found in coffins usurped from a "Chantress of Amen" named Hatet. They had been modified for Tayu-heret's usage in a very expedient fashion by merely writing her name over that of the previous owner (2).

Names changed (in red fields) from that of the original owner (*Hatet*) to *Tayu-heret*.

Notice that her name is written with two different spellings (see section 1.3)

1.3 Description of the workers


The study presented here is based on the documentary background available on the Web as well as on documents from the authors' library. It is obvious that the list of the studied statuettes is far from being exhaustive and will have to be updated. To our knowledge, the most comprehensive sources available now are:

The Sehedj data base: Répertoire bibliographique des figurines funéraires (shabtis / oushebtis) (3).


G. Janes's book "Shabtis, a private view" which describes an example of an overseer for *Tayu-heret* and gives an extensive list of known parallels in museums, private collections and the art market at the date of it's publication (1).

All the workers are made of faience with refulgent mid or bright blue glaze "Deir el Bahari blue" with black painted details. Their size is comprised between 9.8 cm and 11.3 cm. Their general shape when viewed from the front is approximately the same for all parallels we know. They are mummiform, their arms are crossed right over left on the chest and the well molded hands hold a pair of hoes except for three known parallels where hoes are missing. This last feature is very uncommon for workers shabtis of the TIP.

They wear a tripartite wig with horizontal striation (A) across the front of the wig. However, a few workers wear a tripartite wig with perpendicular (B) striation across the front of it. This last characteristic is reminiscent of the small slender workers of *Pi-nudjem I* (4) and of the *Tayu-heret* overseers (5). Two kinds of ornament are present on some specimens: bracelets (C) and/or a *wesekh* collar (D) painted with a few strands.




The inscription painted in black mentions the name of the owner but not any associated title. Her name *Tayu-heret* is written with at least more or less elliptic 6 various spellings (**V1 to V6**):



Moreover, we could distinguish among the artefacts shown here, 4 sets of parallels which present some specific features indicating that at least 4 different painters were involved in the production of these shabtis.

A first set of shabtis was identified and further labelled as **set** A. It is characterized by the following features: a face with well-defined eyebrows and nice eyes. The mouth is molded but not painted, and the wig is horizontally striated. An *wesekh* collar is painted for all the parallels except one. The inscription is spelling V3 and the glyph \hookrightarrow *ws* is drawn in a special manner when compared to other parallels. 11 shabtis belong to this set A. The shabti of the unknown collection S is taken as an example to show these different characteristics.

A second set of shabtis, **set B** is well represented by shabti of the KMT collection.



KMT collection

Its characteristics are the following: The absence of hoes, the absence of the *wesekh* collar, a vertically striated wig, the presence of bracelets painted exactly the same way, the spelling of the name is **V6**. We found 4 shabtis corresponding to this set.

A third set was identified (**set C**). It is best represented by shabti from the HC collection.



HC collection


It is characterized by the following features: the wig is represented with spaced lines and the face is expressive with well depicted eyebrows, eyes and mouth. The inscription looks neglected. First the glyph \mathcal{A} has a strange shape, and then the name is written in an elliptical way. The \mathcal{A} ws is painted in a strange way too. We found 3 shabtis corresponding to this set (may be a fourth one).

A fourth set of shabtis, **set D** is well represented by shabti of Hildesheim museum n° 317.

It is characterized by the following features: the collar is represented with one horizontal band and two verticals lines, the hoes are boldly painted without cord and the bracelet is rather thick. The inscription shows the following characteristics. First the ct is absent, then the glyph ct has a strange shape, and

then the name is written with the glyphs \P and racksim for hr, all glyphs are clearly painted by the same hand.

We found 3 shabtis corresponding to this set D.

2-Museum pieces

On the following pages an overview is provided of the museum pieces which are currently part of their respective collections.

The following information is provided for each piece:

Location: the city and country in which the museum is located and name of the museum are mentioned.

Published: If the museum piece is published in a book or on the internet the name of the publication, author and the relevant page number are mentioned.

Inventory number: The inventory number is mentioned if known.

Provenance: For as far as available the provenance of the piece is described, Detailing the previous owners prior to the entering into the collection of the museum.

Height: The specific height of the shabti is described in centimeters.

Comments: Provide the comments of the authors to the specific pieces, for example, the presence of a vertically striated wig or horizontally one, a *wesekh* collar, bracelets. Other details such as hoes or the quality and the variant of the inscription are mentioned too. Finally, we indicate to which set the shabti belongs to. However some shabtis do not correspond to any of the sets.

4. Discussion

The present paper shows images of 54 workers for the owner *Tayu-heret* coming from the royal cache of Deir el-Bahari.

27 shabtis are located in museums, 27 in private collections.

It is more likely that a few hundreds were present and a lot of them have still to be identified from private collections and museums all around the world.

The quality of the statuettes is uneven.


Spellings of the name on the workers are various: we have identified at least 6 variants but they are probably more, especially if we take into account the way the "justified" formula is painted.

We have identified 4 sets of artefacts decorated by 4 different painters.

The following frames summarize these 4 sets:

Further work is required to identify more painters.

A more accurate study should be necessary in order to determine if different molds were used (this seems to be the case). It is unclear at this moment whether each set corresponds to a given mold and maybe to a corresponding painter who worked on them?

^{*} The labelling of the shabtis shown in the frames is in the same order as in the main catalogue. First the museum parallels (BM for British museum, C for Cairo museum, HLD for Hildesheim museum, Manz for Mainz museum, Vn for Vienna museum) then the known collections and then the unknown collections pieces.
